INNOVATION

International Work

MCF is continuing to develop its international reach from within the UK during the COVID-19 pandemic. We are working with some of our international partners on aspects of national planning aimed at improving child protection practices in Vietnam, Namibia and the Ukraine.

MCF's successful track record of developing child safeguarding practices within the United Kingdom through our CLICK: Path to Protection programme is being developed for International use.

Harm Reduction Resources

We have had an extremely positive response to two new resources we have produced in partnership with the NWG Network.

Developed by our services director Vicki Green, subject matter expert Rhiannon-Faye McDonald with input from other team members and colleagues from NWG, The *Online Sexual Harm Reduction Guide* is aimed at professionals; *How Can I Help My Child?* Is aimed at parents and carers.

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The leaflet aimed at parents and carers explains what forms sexual abuse online can take and helps adults to understand why young people may be at greater risk of harm and why they may not tell. Critically, the leaflet helps parents learn what to do if they believe their child has been harmed, some dos and don'ts and where to go for help.

The professionals' leaflet was developed to address the challenges professionals face in relation to online harm when working with young people. It outlines the specific issues and the ways professionals can engage effectively with young people and their families.

The charities are continuing to work together on a third resource aimed directly at young people. The new resources can be downloaded by clicking <u>here</u>.

EDUCATION

E-Learning Pilot Launched

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learning programme to equip thousands of frontline professionals with the skills to understand the impact of online harm and to help victims recover.


We have been working with professionals in Bedfordshire for over two years, delivering classroom-based training to police officers, health and social care workers, teachers and others whose professional work brings them into contact with children and young people.

Virtual College, which develops digital learning solutions, has the THINK module of our CLICK: Path to Protection training programme and enhanced it with films and interactive facilities to an online package, making it accessible to thousands of staff, many of whom are still working from home.

Currently, staff within local authorities across Bedfordshire are being encouraged to take up the training, which takes only two hours. On completion, trainees are given access to more resources and further training.

Debbie Crawford, head of learning and development at Central Bedfordshire Council, said: "The classroom-based sessions that MCF have delivered in Bedfordshire have been very well received. Developing this online resource makes it even more accessible for practitioners who may not be back at work yet, or uncomfortable with being in a group situation. They can complete the learning at a time and place that's convenient to them.

"The training is very interactive, reassuring and supportive giving the trainee options and then encouraging them to think of other responses they may have not previously considered, rather than being right or wrong. This all supports their learning, raises awareness and helps them to recognise and develop best practice."



Virtual Learning Coming Soon

Colleagues in North Yorkshire are helping us to create accessible trainer-led virtual learning programmes.

Coronavirus has accelerated our plans to take CLICK online and North Yorkshire Safeguarding Children Partnership has supported us by running a pre-pilot with their staff. This has been independently evaluated by the University of Suffolk leading to a full pilot this autumn.

A national roll-out will follow, making the virtual learning available to local authorities, police forces and others across the UK.

Our services director Vicki Green says: "Our classroom-based training is well established but we are adapting to the current situation by working hard with colleagues in North Yorkshire to move the training to a virtual platform where trainers can deliver it in person and trainees can benefit from interactive, case-based learning at home."

The training can be delivered on Zoom, Microsoft Teams or another platform favoured by a particular organisation, and North Yorkshire's feedback is already proving invaluable.

Vicki adds: "We have recognised that sitting and listening for long periods is harder online than if you are in a classroom so we have adapted the training to make it more activity-based and to make full use of the technology with breakout rooms for small, group exercises and discussion.

RECOVERY



Kirklees Project

Our messages to raise awareness of the additional risks of online harm during COVID-19 restrictions and that help is available are reaching across the Kirklees district of West Yorkshire. Funded by the Police and Crime Commissioner for the area Mark Burns-Williamson, the initiative is aimed at secondary school age young people and their parents.

We are grateful for the support of colleagues at Kirklees College and Huddersfield New College whose staff and parents have engaged with the project.

We have also been able to use our learning from this initiative to support a wider project being developed by the Home Office on child vulnerabilities through COVID.

Direct Work with Children and Families

We continue to have a steady flow of referrals for assistance for child victims of online sexual abuse and their parents and carers. We anticipate an increase in referrals once children are settled back at school.

ADVOCACY

Indirect Victims Group

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work to raise awareness of the plight of families of an adult who has been arrested and/or convicted of online sexual abuse. This initiative is led jointly by the MCF, The Lucy Faithfull Foundation and the NWG Network and first Strategic Group meeting took place on 12th October 2020.

In Brief

Some of the other activity we've been involved with since the last newsletter:

June – Attended EVAC 10th Knowledge Exchange Global Webinar.

July – Digital Resilience Working Group – we are involved in a plan for a hub/portal for all resources (relevant to digital resilience framework) to be gathered together online and accessible for everyone. We have also shared our Online Harm Reduction resources and have produced a case study for the hub on the importance of the right messages/language being used to aid recovery for victims.

September – MANAGE training delivered to By The Bridge fostering agency.

Rhiannon continues to be in demand around the world for her insight and ability to tackle the issues around the risks to young people of online harm. She has appeared recently on BBC News and on Irish RTE1 Radio.

Along with colleagues Chief Constable Simon Bailey, the Internet Watch Foundation and Lucy Faithfull Foundation, she has contributed to a documentary for Dateline Australia.

Rhiannon's story is also to be included in Equality Now's research/report on the current laws and gaps in those laws in their target countries of UK, US, Kenya and Nigeria.
